1900's... Today

In the year 1900 the maximum speed reached in most cities in United States of America did not exceed 15 miles per hour; the tallest building in the world was the Eiffel Tower; insulin, plutonium, and antibiotics had not yet been discovered; and there was no duct tape, no crossword puzzles, and no Mother's Day. In the year 1900, even in the most developed countries of America, most people died before reaching the age of forty-seven, mainly from pneumonia, influenza, tuberculosis and diarrhea; 90% of the doctors did not have a university education but attended medical schools, many of which were considered to be of inferior quality; and only 6% of the general population had graduated from high school.

In the year 1900, in the countries that enjoyed the greatest scientific advances, women washed their hair once a month, and with borax or egg yolks, 95% of births were given to them at home, and only 8% of homes had a telephone. In those same countries, some medical authorities claimed that professional seamstresses were subject to sexual arousal because of the constant rhythm, hour after hour of the sewing machine pedals. To counteract these possible effects, they recommended that potassium bromide be poured into the glasses of water they drank, as this sedative was considered to reduce sexual desire. Marijuana, heroin, and morphine could be purchased without a prescription in all pharmacies. All this leads us to reflect on how much progress we have made sense 1900... unless our criterion is morality instead of science. Because if it is moral development and not just intellectual development, or human relationships and not merely sexual, then we have not really made any progress. Moreover, we could conclude that we are going from bad to worse. Instead of practicing moderation, we have abused the knowledge and substances that God has arranged for our good. Hence the tragic consequences we have provoked: the holocaust of racial pride, the fratricide of the world wars and the merciless "ethnic cleansing", the modern slavery of drugs and alcohol, the infanticide that is abortion for convenience, and the postmodern plague that is AIDS, the fruit of the obsession with quasianimal sexual pleasure. at all costs.

It's about time we stopped practicing moral suicide. Today, more than ever, we need to define progress as God defines it, in spiritual terms. Let us repent of our pride and our immoral conduct and ask Him for forgiveness. Only in this way can it be said of us that we are really making progress.
